HUNTING AND FISHING

Summary. This regulation outlines rules governing hunting and fishing activities at the Pine Bluff Arsenal, Arkansas.

Applicability. All individuals permitted to hunt, fish, or participate in outdoor recreational activities on the installation will comply with this regulation.

Proponent and Exception Authority. The proponent of this regulation is the Director of Public Works (DPW).

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PBAR 200-1 Hunting and Fishing Regulations

Chapter 1 Introduction

1-1. Purpose.

This regulation sets forth policies and procedures that govern hunting, fishing, and other recreational activities such as off-road vehicles, and boating.

1-2. References.

A list of required and related publications and prescribed and referenced forms are in Appendix C.

1-3. General.

The Installation Commander intends to maximize hunting and fishing opportunities on the Pine Bluff Arsenal (PBA) consistent with mission requirements, sound environmental and natural resources management practices, and the PBA Integrated Natural Resources Management Plan. Hunting, fishing, and other outdoor recreation activities are permitted when consistent with the military mission and no safety hazard is created. Be aware that the PBA Regulations may be more restrictive than the Arkansas State Hunting and Fishing Regulations.

Chapter 2 Responsibilities

2-1. Natural Resource Office (DPW).

a. Manages fish and wildlife resources consistent with governing laws, regulations, and the Pine Bluff Integrated Natural Resources Management Plan as amended by the Sikes Act, 1997.

b. Sell and Issue Natural Resource Permits and Identification Cards.

Hours of Operation: Natural Resource Permit and Identification Card Sales

Tuesday 0730-10:30 am & 1230-2:30 pm

Thursday 0730-10:30 am & 1230-2:30 pm

c. Ensure that only those individuals entitled to hunt and fish on the installation are issued permits

d. Operates and Maintains the PBA Game Check Station Building 24-570.

e. Develops policies and determines the direction of the wildlife program and is the proponent of this regulation.

f. Coordinates the funding and implementation of the wildlife program.

g. Supervises and manages the wildlife program.

h. Develops and updates PBA Hunting and Fishing Maps on an annual basis.

i. Acts as the Hearing Officer to conduct administrative appeals of suspensions or revocations of hunting and fishing privileges.

j. Receives comments, suggestions, and concerns from soldiers and other personnel authorized to hunt and fish on the PBA and represents their interests to improve hunting and fishing on the installation.

k. Maximizes (IAW CG intent) the opportunities for hunting and fishing on the PBA consistent with training requirements, safety, and governing laws, regulations, and the Pine Bluff Integrated Natural Resources Management Plan.

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l. Annually reviews and provides the installation Commander, with proposed changes to Army Regulation 200-1, Environmental Protection and Enhancement.

m. Conduct safety briefings for hunting.

n. All hunting incidents are to be reported through the PBA Director of Law Enforcement and Security, through the JMC Force Protection Directorate to Headquarters, U.S. Army Material Command Operations Center at (703) 806-9201; DSN 656-9201 or email: hqamc.amcoc@conus.army.mil.

2-2. Director of Law Enforcement and Security (D/LE&S)

a. Enforces the provisions of this regulation.

b. D/LE&S will be the proponent for law enforcement reporting IAW AR 190-45.

b. Reports violations of this regulation to the Permit Issuing Agency and the Hearing Officer (Natural Resource Specialist).

c. Maintains records of sportsmen involved in hunting and fishing violations.

d. Conduct Antiterrorism/Force Protection Background Checks.

e. Registering sportsmen's weapons.

2-3. Sportsmen and recreational users.

a. Understand and comply with all laws, policies, and regulations concerning recreational activities and authorized activities, including those related to personal weapons and hunting and fishing on the installation.

b. Provide upon request:

1) Valid Arkansas Hunting License

2) PBA Weapons Registration certificate

3) Natural Resource picture identification card.

4) PBA Natural Resources Permit

5) Driver's license or other picture ID

6) Hunter Safety Card

c. Report hunting and fishing violations to the D/LE&S Security Desk (540-3501).

d. Immediately report findings of uncovered munitions to the Consolidated Dispatch and Monitoring Center (540-3501 or 540-3505).

e. Recommend changes to the Natural Resource Specialist in accordance with "Suggested Improvements" section to improve the management of hunting and fishing on the PBA. (Call or email suggestion to: 540-3257 / pine.nrm@conus.army.mil).

Chapter 3 Restrictions

3-1. General.

a. The PBA Hunting and Fishing Map is used to control recreational use of training areas, including hunting and fishing activities. Sportsmen will familiarize themselves with the most recent Hunting and Fishing Map prior to hunting or fishing. Hunting may be closed or curtailed without advance notification, as deemed necessary by the Installation Commander. The Installation Commander will determine the appropriate action to be taken IAW AR 190-11. This action may include the immediate evacuation of all hunters from the PBA, or the exclusion of a

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particular group of participants as necessitated by safety and/or security concerns.

b. Hunters shall adhere to the policies contained in PBAR 190-3(G) related to the possession, registration; transport, use, and discharge of firearms (see paragraphs 5-5 and 5-6 below).

c. Hunting and fishing is prohibited in areas and facilities posted as "no hunting".

d. PBA Security and other authorized personnel may search or inspect vehicles entering, traveling through, occupying, or exiting hunting and fishing areas, training areas, and all other areas on the installation.

e. Littering or dumping on the PBA is prohibited.

3-2. Personnel authorized to hunt and fish on the PBA.

a. Hunter Education Course Requirements. All hunters are required to show proof of completion of a hunter's education course to purchase a PBA Natural Resource Permit to be eligible to hunt on the PBA. However, hunters under 12 do not need to have a card if they are under the direct supervision of a sponsor who at least 21 years of age and possess proof of a valid hunter education certification. Evidence of completion includes presenting a valid hunter education card at time of Natural Resource Identification Card purchase. The PBA and the state of Arkansas honor the home state hunter education cards of nonresidents. This includes hunter education courses certified or mandated by any state wildlife agency or Canadian province.

b. The following personnel are authorized to hunt and fish on the PBA when Force Protection Condition Code is Normal, Alpha and Bravo:

- (1) United States Armed Forces active duty personnel.
- (2) United States Armed Forces active duty dependents.
- (3) United States Armed Forces retired personnel.
- (4) Current Civilian Employee personnel.
- (5) Current Civilian Employee dependents.
- (6) Retired Civilian personnel.
- (7) Multi-Year Contract personnel.
- (8) Multi-Year contract dependents.
- (9) National Guard/Reserve personnel.
- (10) National Guard/Reserve dependents.
- (11) General Public Community.

d. The PBA will be closed to hunting and fishing when Force Protection Condition Code is Charlie and Delta.

e. Participants who are listed in paragraphs 3-2 (a-f) must pass an Antiterrorism/Force Protection background check to hunt or fish on the PBA. An Antiterrorism/Force Protection background form is enclosed as Appendix F. Participants who wish to hunt on PBA must complete this form and submit to the Natural Resource Office to initiate the background check. *Applicants must print their names clearly/legibly on the AT/FP Background Check Form.*

3-3. Accessing PBA Installation and the Use of privately owned vehicles (POV) or off-road vehicles (ORV) when hunting or fishing.

a. All vehicles entering the PBA Military Installation must have current registration and insurance as authorized by appropriate regulations and installation policy.

b. While hunting or fishing, the temporary vehicle Access Pass and the Hunting and Fishing

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Access Pass shall be displayed so that they can be read through the front windshield from the outside of the vehicle while hunting at any time of the year. All others riding in the vehicle are required to display their Hunting Access Passes. A hunter may park a vehicle lawfully and ride with another hunter to the hunting site. If a hunter does this, the hunter will display the PBA Hunting/Fishing Access Pass behind the windshield of the second vehicle, not from the parked vehicle.

c. Off-road motorized vehicles (ORV) are prohibited on the PBA, unless installation authorities grant an exception based upon demonstrated medical disability. Disabled hunters may not hunt from a moving ORV. Disabled hunters may submit requests for exception to this policy in accordance with paragraph 3-2c above. Disabled hunters will be required to provide certified documentation from a medical physician concerning their disability. This documentation will be submitted along with their request and must be resubmitted each year to verify no change in status.

d. Individuals shall not block roads or park a vehicle in a manner so as to prevent another vehicle from passing on either a maintained or unimproved road. When picking up or dropping off equipment and/or game, however, an individual may temporarily block another vehicle's passage.

3-4. Areas, boundaries, and access restrictions for hunting and fishing.

a. **PBA hunting and fishing map.** The updated map of the PBA Hunting and Fishing Map, published by the Natural Resource Office, supersedes all previous editions, which are not authorized for use due to significant changes. The map is available at the Game Check Station Bldg 24-570.

b. **Alphanumeric designations.** The PBA Hunting and Fishing Map is divided into alphanumeric compartments, or areas. Hunting areas will open and close depending on scheduled training and other events.

(1) *Closed Areas.* Areas are closed for recreation on days when they are designated as closed.

(2) *Open Areas.* These areas are open for hunting with the designated weapons. Prior to entering open areas, sportsmen must verify that areas are open by checking at the Game Check Station Bldg 24-570.

c. Security has designated the pistol range "operational" every Tuesday and Thursday. Therefore areas 3H, 3G, and 3K will be closed every Tuesday and Thursday for hunting use based upon mission requirements. Sportsmen must verify daily open areas by checking the Hunter and fisherman check-in system at the Game Check Station, bldg 24-570.

d. Sportsmen, persons, individuals in a vehicle, will not bypass sentries, road guards, roadblocks, cables or closed and locked gates even if the area is open for hunting or fishing. Some areas may be closed to foot traffic only.

e. All persons are required to enter or exit the installation at Plainview Gate.

f. Hunting, fishing, and/or parking in designated restrictive areas is prohibited. Sportsmen must check the Hunting and Fishing Map to identify the location open to hunting/fishing.

g. Area specific restrictions and weapons authorized to hunt in them. The following areas have specific hunting restrictions:

(1) **Bow-only areas.** Sportsmen shall only use weapons identified in paragraph 5-5.b.

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For current bow hunting areas refer to the PBA Hunting and Fishing Map. Archery hunting is prohibited within 100 yards of buildings.

(2) Shotgun and Muzzleloading areas. Sportsmen may only use weapons identified in paragraph 5-5.c. For current Shotgun and Muzzle Loading hunting areas refer to the PBA Hunting and Fishing Map. Shotgun and Muzzleloading is prohibited within 250 yards of buildings.

(3) Areas designated as open for hunting. On the map boards and computer generated 'black and white' Hunting and Fishing Information Sheets by using the color code system described below:

RED SHADED– Areas shaded in Red are either impact areas, closed for an extended period of time, or closed for all hunting on that day.

RED NUMBERED AREAS– Areas with Red Numbering are open for all authorized weapons.

WHITE NUMBERED AREAS- Areas with Green Numbering are closed to firearms hunting, but are open for ARCHERY HUNTING ONLY.

(4) Named pond areas. Yellow Lake and the old river slew adjacent to the River are the ONLY AREAS designated for checking in to hunt waterfowl. On a first come first serve basis Hunters must check into the blind location that they desire to hunt.

(5) Hunting Compartments (Appendix A). Hunting compartments on post are divided by boundaries that separate gun and archery only hunting. Hunters must be in the correct section of the compartment for the weapon being used for hunting as depicted on the hunting and fishing map.

(6) Access for Disabled Veteran, Military Dependents with Disabilities, and Other Persons with Disabilities. In developing facilities and conducting programs for public outdoor recreation PBA shall ensure, to the extent reasonably practicable, that outdoor recreation opportunities (including fishing, hunting, trapping, wildlife viewing, and boating) made available to the public also provide access for persons in the prescribed paragraph when topographic, vegetative, and water resources allow access for such without substantial modification to the natural environment. 3-5. Cultural Resources. Individuals may not disturb archeological sites on the PBA. The use or possession of metal detectors or any other device to locate or collect artifacts is prohibited.

Chapter 4 Safety

4-1. General. To avoid injuries and possible loss of life, hunting, fishing, and all other recreational activities must be accomplished in a safe and responsible manner. Many restrictions on hunting and fishing activities are based upon safety considerations. Anyone discovering or having knowledge of an accident or incident occurring on the installation will notify the D/LE&S Security Desk (540-3501).

a. Feral swine precautions. Feral swine can transmit diseases to humans and domestic animals. Hunters should wear plastic gloves when field-dressing feral swine; wash their hands

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with soap and water as soon as possible after contact; avoid direct contact with the animal's blood and reproductive organs; and cook the meat thoroughly.

b. Safety light. Many hunters travel to and from their hunting area, tree stand, or blind just before dawn and after dusk. It is recommended that hunters use a small light while traveling to and from their stands or hunting area in periods of limited visibility. Use of a small light will help hunters identify one another during low light conditions.

4-2. Policies

a. Hunter Orange.

(1) Hunter orange, chartreuse or blaze camouflage must be worn by all hunters during modern gun or muzzleloader deer season. The garment must total at least 400 square inches above the waist. In addition, a hunter orange, chartreuse or blaze camouflage head garment must be worn.

(2) This requirement to wear hunters orange extends to all hunters including archers during the modern gun (shotgun) season except when hunting waterfowl. Waterfowl hunters must wear the prescribed amount of hunter orange only when walking to or from a waterfowl hunting site.

(3) Persons accompanying a hunter must meet the same hunter orange requirements as the hunter.

(4) Hunters are not required to wear hunter orange when traveling in a vehicle or when on foot no more than twenty (20) feet from a vehicle.

(5) While not required, turkey hunters are encouraged to wear hunter orange when changing locations in the field or when carrying a harvested turkey out of the field.

b. Hunter Control check-in and harvest information. All hunters must check-in and out-of hunting areas daily. This requirement exists to ensure the number of hunters does not exceed the area's capacity and to ensure that hunters can be quickly evacuated if needed. The PBA uses a Hunters Control Program which is located in the Game Check Station Bldg 24-570 as the primary method to check-in and out-of to a hunting area. In the unlikely event that hunter control systems fail, then hunters may hunt after verifying that the area is in fact open for hunting by checking with the Natural Resource Specialist. DO NOT call the D/LE&S Security Desk (540-3501) to check into an area. Detailed procedures for check-in and out-of to an area or recording game harvested are provided in chapter 11.

c. Alcohol and drugs. Hunters will not be intoxicated, possess alcohol on their person, or consume alcoholic beverages while hunting. Hunters will not be under the influence of illegal drugs or possess them while hunting.

d. Safety straps. All persons are required to use a safety strap or harness while hunting off the ground in stands, trees, and other structures.

e. Weapons. Paragraph 5-5 specifies safety restrictions on weapons and ammunition. Paragraph 5-6 reiterates the PBA policies on the possession, registration, storage, transport, and discharging of weapons.

Chapter 5 Hunting Regulations

5-1. General

- a. Baiting is not allowed on the PBA with the exception of trapping as indentified in 5-1(r).
- b. Vehicles will not be driven through planted wildlife fields or feed strips.
- c. Individuals will not remove, destroy, or mutilate the head of a deer until it is processed or delivered to a facility for storage and processing.
- d. It is unlawful to capture, take, or possess any game bird or animal for use as a pet. It is unlawful to release into the wild or import any wildlife without first coordinating with the Natural Resource Office, DPW, and obtaining a permit from the appropriate state agency. Individuals may use Falcons or other birds of prey on the PBA provided they comply with applicable Arkansas law.
- e. Yellow Lake, the Slew adjacent to the Arkansas River and the slough adjacent to the buckshot pit may be utilized for waterfowl hunting. Hunting hours in these areas shall end at 12:00 pm. Waterfowl hunting on the PBA after 12:00 pm is prohibitive.
- f. Turkey hunting will be in accordance with PBA Turkey Hunting Drawing Procedures (Appendix B).
- g. Organized deer drives are not authorized on PBA unless specifically designated to maintain deer population.
- h. Hunters may not guide hunt in exchange for money or other compensation on the PBA.
- i. Hunting Stands. Deer stands may not be placed more than seven days before deer archery season and must be removed within seven days after the close of deer archery season. All hunters are required to use a safety strap or harness while hunting off the ground in stands, trees, and other structures where applicable.
- j. Portable hunting stands and associated equipment using **NO** metal objects (such as screw-in steps) to be screwed or driven into trees may be used, but must have owners name, address, and phone number permanently attached.
- k. Permanent structures such as buildings, free standing, or lean-to type tree stands are prohibitive. A permanent stand is defined as any stand that cannot be safely moved by one (1) sportsman.
- l. Stands no longer used or that are structurally unsafe should be dismantled and removed from the area. Hunting stands must be positioned in an area so that a hunter can legally fire or discharge his or her weapon in accordance with paragraph 5-5.
- m. Any hunter may use another hunter's stand, however, it is expected that prior to doing so, the hunter will make a courtesy call to the individual whose name is on the stand, consistent with common courtesy and hunter etiquette.
- n. Tagging game. Immediately upon taking a deer (before moving it), remove the appropriate deer tag from the AGFC license and complete all information, except Check #, legibly and in ink. Fasten the tag to the leg, ear or antler of a deer. The tag must remain with the animal until final processing and storage.
 - (1) Hunters with disability licenses, 62 Plus Lifetime hunting license, and hunters under 16 years of age may use the game tags in the AGFC guidebook or substitute a piece of paper with their name, the date, time and Zone 12 written legibly in ink.

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- (2) Call 866-305-0808, visit www.agfc.com or use iPhone app to check your deer.
- (3) Record the check number on your tag.
- (4) Entrails must be removed in field, but evidence of the animal's sex must remain until checked at the PBA Check Station.
- (5) Check game at the PBA Game Check Station and complete required data on Game check-in data sheet.

NOTE: Any Hunter transporting Big Game animals across the boundary of the PBA before being tagged is in violation of the Lacey Act. The maximum penalty for violation of the Lacey Act is \$10,000 with possible imprisonment for one year.

o. Persons transporting a deer or turkey harvested by another hunter must possess, in writing, the complete name, address, telephone number, Arkansas Hunting License Number and permit number of the person who harvested the deer or turkey.

p. Training and hunting with dogs. Dogs are prohibited from use in hunting deer or feral swine on the installation. However, dogs may be used for other legal forms of hunting associated with small game and waterfowl. Dogs must wear a collar at all times bearing the owner's name, phone number, and proof of vaccination.

q. Trapping (other than feral hogs) on the PBA will be in accordance with the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission trapping regulations. Game wardens and installation wildlife management personnel may trap for predator control and medical purposes only. Game wardens may trap dogs and other domestic animals, as required.

r. Trapping feral hogs. Feral hogs are not native to North America, but many feral hogs live in Arkansas because of illegal releases and high reproductive success. Hogs compete directly with many native game and animals for food and destroy habitat for many other wildlife species. Hogs are responsible for habitat destruction, damage to plant and/or animal communities, disease, and direct competition with native wildlife. The Arkansas Game and Fish encourages the eradication of feral hogs on PBA. Therefore, the trapping of feral hogs is approved year-round on PBA. Sportsmen must be in compliance with all regulations (PBAR 215-2).

NOTE: Baiting for feral hogs. No bait may be placed outside traps from September 15th - February 28th and April 1st-May 15th.

s. Endangered and threatened species.

(1) In accordance with AR 200-1, Environmental Protection and Enhancement, it is unlawful for any person subject to the jurisdiction of the U.S. to harass, harm, or capture any endangered species within the U.S.

(2) The PBA is home to the American Alligator, classified as threatened by association. Sportsmen must be aware that it is a serious violation of federal law to infringe upon the habitat of an endangered or threatened species. Violators will be prosecuted in federal court. Hunters are urged to be sensitive to environmental concerns and ensure that their actions are consistent with good wildlife management practices. Sportsmen should report violations of this or any other regulation to D/LE&S Security Desk (540-3501).

(3) All sportsmen in vehicles must keep a watchful eye for Gopher Tortoises and try to avoid them if they are encountered while crossing roadways.

t. The use of any electronic call is prohibited (except that electronic calls may be used to hunt crows, coyotes and feral swine.) The possession of any electronic calling device capable of producing real or imitation calls of any type except when hunting crows or a coyote is prohibited.

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- u. Hunters may use cell phones, pagers, two-way radios, Global Positioning Satellite (GPS) position location devices, and bionic ear devices while hunting.
- v. Taking a deer while it is in a river, lake, stream, or pond is prohibited.
- w. Use of electronic or mechanical decoys for turkey hunting is prohibited on the installation.
- x. The only site in which game is allowed to be processed is at the game check station.

5-2. Minimum age requirements

a. Persons younger than 12 years of age must be with a sponsor while hunting, but are not authorized to carry a weapon; these hunters may harvest game with the sponsor's weapon while under the direct supervision of an adult sponsor 21 years old or older. A person under 12 years of age hunter's education requirement is deferred to the adult sponsor in whom the child is under the direct supervision of. The sponsor must be at least 21 years of age and possesses proof of a valid hunter education certification.

b. Persons 12-15 years of age must be under the direct supervision of an adult sponsor 21 years old or older. Carrying a weapon or weapons for hunting is permitted. Persons under 16 years of age are not required to possess a Natural Resource Permit or an Arkansas hunting license; however they must possess proof of completion of a hunter's education course and a Natural Resource picture identification card.

c. Persons 16 years of age or older must obtain a Natural Resource Permit to hunt on the installation and may carry a weapon to hunt on their own without a sponsor present. All persons 16 years of age or older that hunt must have the appropriate state license for the game they are hunting as well as background checks.

d. "Direct adult supervision" is defined as within "arms reach" of a person 21 years old or older.

e. Adult sponsors may not have more than two (2) hunters 12-15 years of age carrying weapons while under their supervision at one time.

5-3. Hunting seasons. Hunting seasons on the PBA will coincide with the hunting season of the State of Arkansas unless otherwise directed during the annual hunting safety briefing. It is the sportsman responsibility to understand and comply with all hunting season set on PBA. See Chapter 10.

5-4. Hunting hours. The legal hunting hours for hunting on the PBA are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset with the following exceptions: Legal hours for migratory bird hunting (such as, duck and dove) will be determined by the appropriate federal agency. Hunting waterfowl on Yellow Lake and the old river slough adjacent to the Arkansas River shall end at **12:00pm**.

5-5. Legal weapons and ammunition.

a. *Center fire rifles, rim fire rifles, and pistols are prohibitive on the PBA.* The only legal weapons for hunting are shotguns, muzzleloaders, and archery. Deer and turkey may be hunted with weapons in accordance with the applicable state's open season and PBA hunting restrictions.

(1) Archery. Long bows, recurve bows, compound bows, and crossbows are the only weapons permitted in bow-only areas.

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(2) Modern Gun Season. Shotgun-only

(3) Muzzle Loading Season. Muzzleloaders

b. Legal weapons for feral swine. Hunters may kill feral hogs on the PBA during daylight hours during any open hunting season as long as they are using a weapon legal for that season. Feral hogs killed on the PBA can be taken for processing or left where they were shot. Hunters may not use dogs and may not hunt at night. Hunters may trap feral hogs on PBA with proper permits. Baiting traps for feral hog is prohibitive during deer and turkey season.

5-6. Weapons Policies. The PBA weapons policies are provided in PBAR 190-3(G). Hunters are responsible for familiarizing themselves with regulations. Make sure you read and understand the new regulations in order to avoid any violations.

Chapter 6

Fishing Regulations

6-1. General

a. All persons wishing to fish on PBA 16 years and older will be required to have an Antiterrorism Background Protection Check in order to be approved.

b. Children less than 16 years of age are not required to purchase a PBA Natural Resource Permit; however, they must be under the direct supervision of an adult sponsor 18 years old or older.

c. Ponds will be closed to fishing two weeks after being stocked. Signs will be posted prior to ponds being stocked and when these ponds are closed to fishing.

d. It is unlawful to park within 50 feet of a boat ramp or in such a fashion that will impede others from either launching or retrieving their boat.

6-2. Methods

a. Only rod and reel sport fishing is permitted in PBA waters. Trotline use in any pond or slough areas is prohibited.

b. Seining in streams or ponds is prohibited.

c. Use of fish traps, snatch hooks, or spears are prohibited and will not be used on or around any of the ponds and streams on the PBA.

d. Individuals may gig for frogs with a gig that has at least three prongs. A State fishing license and a Natural Resource Permit are required to gig for frogs.

e. Bows and arrows may be used to take non-game fish.

f. Hand-held throw nets for bait collection are permitted. Any game fish caught while collecting bait will be released.

6-3. Creel limits.

a. Creel limits will comply with Arkansas Regulations. However, the PBA Natural Resource Manager may further restrict creel limits as necessary to protect/enhance fish productivity.

b. All creel limits apply on a daily basis. At no time will an individual continue to fish once the limit has been attained.

6-4. Seasons. All ponds and streams on the PBA are open to fishing throughout the year, unless

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closed for management or training purposes. The RCRA Surface Impoundment in Area 3R is closed to fishing permanently. If need arises that other ponds should be closed “No fishing” signage will be placed around the pond.

Chapter 7

Licenses, Permits, and Fees

7-1. General.

a. When hunting or fishing on the PBA, you must have the appropriate licenses, permits, and personal identification in your possession at that time.

b. A quick information reference is provided in Appendix E, Point of Contact (POC) Information.

7-2. Federal license. If the wildlife you are hunting requires the purchase of a federal license, permit or stamp, then you must have that license, permit or stamp in your possession at the time you are hunting. For example, if you are hunting migratory birds, then you must have a Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp (federal duck stamp) and the Migratory Bird Harvest Information Program Permit (HIP). The Federal Duck Stamp must be signed in ink across the face.

7-3. State license. Anyone who hunts or fishes on PBA must have appropriate hunting or fishing licenses from Arkansas and must comply with state laws, subject to the following.

a. **State of Arkansas.** To hunt on the installation, all hunters must meet all requirements for (age, residency, and proof of hunter safety course) and purchase an Arkansas State Hunting License.

Military personnel.

(1) **Residency.** For the purpose of hunting and fishing, the State of Arkansas considers all full-time military personnel (and their dependents) assigned to active duty at an Arkansas military base, to be Arkansas residents who may therefore purchase Arkansas resident (as opposed to nonresident) hunting and fishing licenses.

(2) Arkansas Service men and women who are active-duty service members who are on leave and are residents of the state must purchase Arkansas resident hunting and fishing license.

b. **Hunter education course requirements.** All hunters are required to show proof of completion of a hunter’s education course to purchase a PBA Natural Resource Permit to be eligible to hunt on the PBA. However, hunters under 12 do not need to have a card if they are under the direct supervision of a sponsor who at least 21 years of age and possess proof of a valid hunter education certification. The PBA and the state of Arkansas honor the home state hunter education cards of nonresidents. Evidence of completion includes presenting a valid hunter education card at time of FMWR activity card purchase.

7-4. PBA permits.

Personnel authorized to hunt and fish on the PBA in accordance with (IAW) paragraph 3-2 above, and who possess a valid State license, may purchase annual hunting and fishing permits.

(1) **Hunting Permits.** Persons hunting on the PBA, who are 16 years of age or older, must

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obtain a Natural Resource Permit and ID Card. To obtain these permits, a state hunting license is required. All PBA permits are available from the Natural Resource Specialist or representative.

(2) Fishing Permits. A Natural Resource Permit and ID card are required for any person age 16 or older to fish in any waters (pond or stream) on the PBA to include the Arkansas River access. Fishing in streams or backwater areas of the Arkansas River do not require a permit if Sportsman does not use PBA for access and is fishing from a boat. However, bank fishing in these areas requires a permit.

7-5. Fee and permit prices. The cost of hunting and fishing fees and are subject to change.

Chapter 8

Violations of Fish and Wildlife Laws, Rules, and Regulations

8-1. Game Enforcement. Arkansas Game and Fish Commission Wildlife Officers will enforce Game and Fish Laws and Regulations in accordance with the Arkansas State Game and Fish Commission Code Book. This applies to both Federal and State Laws and Regulations.

8-2. Policies.

a. Inspections. All individuals must have valid Arkansas state hunting or fishing licenses, PBA weapons registration certificate, Natural Resource picture identification card, PBA Natural Resource hunting or fishing permit, driver's license or other picture ID, and Hunters Safety Card. These documents must be made available, upon request, to any enforcement person. Hunters will not leave their Hunting/Fishing Access Pass in a parked vehicle if they ride in another vehicle to a hunting area. Hunters must display their hunting passes in the vehicle from which they hunt.

b. Report of violations. Sportsmen are encouraged to report any observed violations of this regulation and/or State and Federal laws to the D/LE&S Security Desk (540-3501).

c. Administrative actions.

(1) Individuals observed or reported to be violating any regulation or law relating to hunting and fishing on the PBA, will receive a notice of suspension of installation hunting and/or fishing privileges from citing officials. Upon receipt of this notice, the individual's hunting and fishing privileges are immediately suspended for the period of time specified in the notice. If the individual disagrees and believes that he did not commit an offense, he must, within seven (7) days, file an appeal with the Installation Hearing Officer, Natural Resource Office (540-3257). Failure to contact the Installation Hearing Officer within

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- seven (7) days will constitute waiver of the right to appeal and the suspension will stand.
- (2) If an individual files an appeal, he may request a hearing with the Installation Hearing Officer. At this hearing, an individual may present evidence that could help in considering the appeal.
- (3) Although an appeal is filed, the suspension remains in effect until the matter is decided.
- (4) The Installation Hearing Officer will consider each case and recommend a decision within two weeks. This recommendation will be forwarded through the Staff Judge Advocate for review and then to the Installation Commander for action. The Installation Hearing Officer will provide notice of the Commander's decision to the individual and to the Permit Issuing Activity, the Natural Resource Office, DPW, and the Provost Marshal. While there is no further right to appeal this decision, the hearing officer and the Installation Commander, may, for good cause shown and in their complete discretion, consider requests for reconsideration.
- (5) If the appeal is denied, the suspension will run for the time specified in the original notice. The period of suspension is calculated from the date the notice is issued, not the date of final action.
- (6) A list of the standard Administrative Penalties for various infractions is found in Appendix D, Violations and penalties.

Chapter 9

Use of Boats and Motorized Land Vehicles

9-1. Boats. Boats may be used to fish on the PBA, subject to the following conditions:

- a. Privately owned motorboats must be registered and meet all requirements in accordance to the State of Arkansas.
- b. A personal flotation device (PDF) is required for each passenger in the boat. This device must be U.S. Coast Guard approved and the appropriate size for the passengers.
- c. Any person operating any watercraft on the waters of the installation shall comply with the applicable Federal and Arkansas safety rules and regulations relative to boat equipment, operation, lights, and navigation rules.
- d. All lakes, ponds, rivers, and streams on the installation are off-limits to recreational swimming, water skiing, aquaplaning, and scuba diving.

9-2. Motorized land vehicles. Privately owned motorized off-road vehicles (ORV) and all-terrain vehicles (ATV) of any type (two, three or four-wheel) are prohibited on PBA. Motor vehicles used to hunt or fish on PBA must meet applicable safety, licensing, insurance, and registration requirements for use on public roads.

Chapter 10

Hunting Seasons, Bag Limits, and Mandatory Deer Check.

10-1. Mandatory deer check. All deer harvested must be brought to the Game Check Station located at building #24-560 complete mandatory game check in sheet and procedures. **All deer harvested must be checked with AGFC!**

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10-2. Season dates and bag limits. Season dates and bag limits may be more restrictive than those set by the State of Arkansas. It is the sportsman’s responsibility to make themselves familiar with and comply with the hunting and fishing seasons, regulations, and bag limits, for PBA. *Due to the requirement to harvest a doe before harvesting a legal buck, the Private Land Antlerless Only Modern Gun Season will not be acknowledge on PBA!*

Special Youth Hunts:

Only youths 6 to 15 years old may harvest deer during the special youth modern gun deer hunt. Youths who have completed hunter education must be accompanied by an adult at least 18 years old. Youths who have not completed hunter education must be under the direct supervision of an adult at least 21.

A buck may be harvested before a doe only during the special youth hunts.

Youth may only harvest one buck per season. (NOTE: Antler-point restrictions for bucks do not apply to youth hunters any time during this hunt or the rest of deer season.)

All deer harvested count toward the youth’s seasonal bag limit.

Only during the modern gun youth hunt may a buck be harvested before a doe!

**Chapter 11
Hunter Check-in and Game Harvest Reporting Procedures**

11-1. General.

The Game Check Station, building 24-560, located south of Plainview Gate, will be open during all approved hunting seasons. PBA hunting seasons will conform to the published Arkansas

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Game and Fish commission regulations for Deer Zone 12 unless otherwise instructed during hunters safety briefings. All hunters must check-in and check-out at the Game Check Station using software program that is available at the Game Check Station. The Garrison Commander has the privilege of closing the PBA or section of the PBA at anytime. If an area has been closed to hunting it will be recorded as such at the Game Check Station.

11-2. Check-in, check-out and report harvest procedure.

(1) Review the PBA Hunting and Fishing Map and identify the area you will hunt. The land on the PBA has been divided into a number of designated areas as is depicted on the PBA Hunting and Fishing Map.

(2) Swipe appropriate Natural Resource ID Card under computer scanner and follow computer prompts requiring the hunter to enter the area he/she will be hunting.

(3) The computer will then print out a parking receipt identifying the area in which the hunter will be hunting. This parking receipt is to be placed on the front dash of the hunter's vehicle. If two or more hunters carpool to the hunting area, all hunters in the vehicle will place their parking receipt on front dash of the vehicle the hunters are in.

(4) If a hunter changes hunting areas he/she must return to Game Check Station check-out of original hunting area and check-in to new hunting area.

(5) All Hunters must check-out from Game Check Station software system when leaving a hunting area.

APPENDIX A

1. **Number of Hunters per Hunting Area.** To ensure a safe physical separation between hunters in hunting areas there will be no more than one (1) hunter per seventy acres. The listed hunting areas, acreage and maximum number of hunters per area are listed below.

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2. Archery ONLY Areas.

1D - Sibert Road and the gravel road from Sibert road to the PBA Waterfowl Refuge is the East boundary and divides hunting area 1D from 1C and the PBA Waterfowl Refuge. The PBA boundary fence is the West boundary. The gravel road from Sibert road to the railroad tracks is the North boundary.

1E - All wooded areas inside of the Production Area fence. Persons wishing access to the Production Area (Controlled Access Area, 1E) must possess an M type badge or be escorted by a person with an M badge. POV's are prohibited for recreational use in the Production Area Controlled Access Area, 1E). Participants may either walk-in or ride a bicycle for access to the Production Area for hunting or fishing activities.

1F - The gravel road from Warbritton Gate to the back access road of the Production Area is the West boundary and divides hunting area 1F and 1B. The PBA boundary fence is the East and North boundary.

3B - The small wooded areas between Hoadley road and the Production Area fence, and McCoy road and the Production area fence.

3C - Hoadley road is the South boundary. Sibert road is the West boundary. McCoy road is the East boundary. The "No Hunting" signs and blue painted boundary line is the North boundary.

3D – The North boundary runs from the parameter road along cut-through road toward golf maintenance building to old logging road. Then runs along old logging road to Fleming extension "T" road. The boundary turns and then runs southeast along paved road until it reaches the Reserve Unit boundary fence and then runs southwest along old housing road back to parameter road. The West boundary runs along parameter road north back to cut-through road.

3E - The sewer line right-of-way is the West boundary. The power line right-of-way from McCoy road to the Commander's quarters is the East boundary and divides hunting area 3E from 3I. The back access road into the NCO Capehart Housing Area is the South boundary and divides hunting area 3E from 3C. The "No Hunting" signs and blue painted boundary line is the North boundary.

3N – The old logging trail from Atkisson Road to Horseshoe Pond to McCoy Road is the North boundary and divides hunting areas 3N and 3P. The East boundary runs from old logging road and McCoy Road intersection South along McCoy road to culvert under McCoy Road then turns and runs along creek back to Tulley Lake shoreline. The East boundary continues along the North side of Tulley Lake shoreline to the Entergy high voltage power line right-of-way then South along right-of-way to Wise Road. The South boundary follows Wise Road to Sibert Road then along Sibert Road to Atkisson Road back to old logging Road.

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3O – The Surface Impoundment Road from unnamed tributary of Phillips Creek north to Webster Road is the west boundary. The north boundary runs from the Surface Impoundment Road east along Webster Road to Doolittle road. The east boundary runs along Doolittle road south to the unnamed tributary of Phillips Creek. The south boundary runs west along unnamed tributary of Phillips Creek to the Surface Impoundment Road.

3S – The north boundary starts at Rideout Road and runs along Webster Road to the Surface Impoundment Road. The east boundary runs along the Surface Impoundment Road to yellow gate. The south boundary runs from the yellow gate to the containment fence to the rear of warehouses and turns back to Rideout Road.

5A – The north boundary runs from old duck pond road gate along PBA boundary fence to the Arkansas River. The east boundary runs along river shoreline to painted line and then turns west and runs back to Doolittle Road. The east west boundary runs along Doolittle road buffer area and then follows buffer area back out to Wintergreen road. The south boundary follows Wintergreen road along Haul road back to old duck pond road gate.

5B – The north boundary runs from the intersection of Roemer Road and NCTR boundary road to Wintergreen Road. The east boundary runs along the gravel portion of Wintergreen Road to the Haul Road. The south boundary follows Haul road west to exclude the 93-XXX parking area and structures to 504th Street. The west boundary runs north along 504th Street to Roemer Road and from Roemer Road back to PBA boundary intersection.

5D – The north boundary runs from the intersection of Roemer Road and 504th Street along 504th Street to 6242 Avenue. The south boundary from 6242 Avenue to the BREA fence line and then turns northwest along the BREA fence line to Roemer Road. The boundary turns northeast and follows Roemer Road back to 504th Street.

5E – The north boundary runs from the power lines just north of 507th Street along Haul Road to old Demil boundary fence. The east boundary runs along old demil boundary fence to Webster Road. The south boundary runs west along Webster Road turning south onto Rideout Road and continues along Rideout Road to 507th Street. The west boundary follows 507th Street north to the power line turning north and following the power line to Haul Road.

3. Shotgun and Muzzleloader Areas.

1A - The PBA boundary fence is the boundary on the East and South sides. Williams road from Warbritton to the Production Area fence is the North boundary. The stream from Production Area fence to the PBA Boundary fence is the West boundary and divides hunting 1A and 1C.

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1B - Williams road from Warbritton to the Production Area fence is the South boundary. The Production Area fence and back access road into the Production area is the North Boundary. The gravel road from Warbritton Gate to the back access road of the Production Area is the East boundary and divides hunting area 1B and 1F.

1C - The stream from the Production Area fence to the PBA boundary fence is the East boundary of the hunting area and divides hunting area 1C and 1A. Roadway in front of the PBA Waterfowl Refuge is the South boundary. Williams road is the North boundary. The gravel road from Williams road to the PBA Waterfowl Refuge is the West boundary and divides hunting area 1C from 1D.

1G - The back access road into the Production Area is the South boundary. The Production Area fence is the West boundary. The PBA boundary patrol road and fence is the East boundary.

3A - The PBA boundary fence is the South boundary. White Creek is the East boundary. McCoy road is West boundary. Yellow lake levee road is the North boundary.

3F - McCoy road is the South and West boundary. The Yellow Bluff drop-off is the East boundary and divides hunting area 3F from 3G. The vehicle trail from McCoy road to the bluff is the North boundary and divides hunting area 3F from 3J.

3G - The Yellow Bluff drop-off is the West and North boundary and divides hunting area 3G from 3F, 3J and 3K. The dirt road from the flag pole on Yellow Lake road to Yellow Bluff is the East boundary and divides hunting area 3G from 3H. Yellow Lake is the South boundary.

3H - The dirt road from the flag pole on Yellow Lake road to Yellow Bluff is the West boundary and divides hunting area 3H from 3G. The PBA boundary fence is the East boundary. The Yellow Lake road is the South Boundary and divides hunting area 3H from 3W. Triplett's creek is the North boundary.

3I - The powerline right-of-way from McCoy road to the Commander's quarters is the West boundary and divides hunting area 3E from 3I. McCoy road is the South and East boundaries. Wise road from the Commander's quarters to the Tulley Lake Picnic Area is the North boundary.

3J - McCoy road is the West boundary. Tulley Creek is the North boundary. The Bluff is the East boundary and divides hunting area 3J and 3G. The vehicle trail from McCoy road to Yellow Bluff is the South boundary and divides hunting area 3J from 3F.

3K - The north boundary of this area is from the intersection of Tulley Creek and Phillips Creek west along Phillips Creek to McCoy Road. The west boundary follows McCoy Road south to Tulley Creek. The southeastern boundary runs along Tulley Creek to the point in which it intersects Phillips Creek.

3P - The old logging trail from Horseshoe Pond to McCoy road is the South boundary and divides hunting area 3P from 3N. The stream drainage from the Surface Impoundment pond to McCoy road is the East boundary and divides hunting area 3P from 3Q. The Surface

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
Impoundment road from the Surface impoundment pond to the big drainage ditch at the head of the Surface Impoundment pond is the North boundary. McCoy road is the South boundary and divides hunting area 3P from 3K.

3R - The Surface Impoundment road is the East and South boundary. Webster road is the North boundary. The access road into the Secondary Surface impoundment pond and the Hazardous Waste Borrow Pit field is the West boundary.

3W - White Creek is the Southwest boundary and separates hunting area 3W from 3A. Yellow Lake levee road to the Arkansas River is the West and North boundary. The Arkansas River is the East boundary.

Wounded Warrior Only Hunting Area – This area be used for special hunts only (Wounded Warrior Special Hunt). It will be considered a no hunting area except during special hunts. This areas west boundary would start at the Stark Entrance and continue along the PBA boundary until reaching Roemer Road on the east side of the tract. The southeast boundary of the area would run along Roemer Road back to the Stark Entrance. The CLA is to be included within these boundaries.

Pine Bluff Arsenal Turkey Hunting Drawing Procedures

Firearms: TBA

Permit Required: One bearded turkey; NO JAKES

To prevent overcrowding, the PBA limits some hunting opportunities through a permit draw system. Lowering hunter numbers not only regulates harvest, it offers a better hunting experience for the hunters who draw the tags.

Applying is free, but successful applicants must pay \$35 to receive PBA hunt permits. An Antiterrorism/Force Protection Background Check must have been performed within the last year.

Participation is open to all persons who wish to enter the drawing. All successful applicants will be required to have a valid Arkansas hunting license, proof of an acceptable hunter's safety course, a PBA Natural Resources Permit and a picture badge before being allowed to hunt turkey on PBA.

A drawing will be held the first TBA. The drawing will commence at Creasy Auditorium. Ten names will be randomly selected for the three (3) day authorized Spring Gobbler season.

Applicants are required to attend the drawing and will only be allowed to represent themselves. Selected applicants will be authorized to hunt turkey on PBA during the PBA turkey season.

Applicants that are selected under the age of 16 must meet all requirements in PBAR 200-1 to participate in hunt.

The PBA turkey season will be as follows:

All turkey harvested on PBA must be legally checked through the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission and recorded properly at PBA Check Station before leaving post.

***Participants must comply with all Arkansas Game and Fish Commission gaming regulations.**

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Section II

Terms

Accompany. To meet this requirement, the sponsor and guest must be properly checked-in through Hunter Control, the sponsor must be physically present and/or participating in the hunt and be signed into the same area or areas as the guest. If signed into multiple areas and both sponsor and guest are not occupying the same area, the areas must share a common boundary and be adjacent to each other.

Active status. The term "active status" means the status of a member of a reserve component who is not in the inactive Army National Guard or inactive Air National Guard or on an inactive status list.

Baited area. Any place which contains or has contained within the previous ten (10) days feed, grains, salt licks, or other substances capable of luring game.

Big game. Deer and turkey. Feral swine are not classified as big game animals.

Bow. A long bow, recurve bow, compound bow, or a crossbow. Bows must have a minimum pull of 40 lbs.

Buck. A male deer.

Cooperative Agreement. The agreement entered into by PBA, the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission, and the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

Direct adult supervision. Under the command and control of a person 18 years old or older, with the minor being within sight or hearing distance of such person.

Family member. A son/daughter, brother/sister, or father/mother.

Fish or fishing. To catch, capture, take, or kill fish and all seafood and includes all lesser acts such as attempting to catch, capture, or kill by any device or method.

Guide hunting. Receiving compensation for assisting an individual in the pursuit and taking of game.

Hunt or hunting. The act of pursuing, shooting, killing, and/or capturing wildlife or using any device in an attempt to take wildlife. Hunting shall include every action of assistance to any person in taking or attempting to take wildlife, however accompanying a hunter as a spectator, maintaining or placing stands, or assisting a hunter to locate, track, or recover wounded or harvested game is not considered hunting. Any individual possessing a bow, gun, or gun and dogs in any area where hunting is normally conducted is presumed to be hunting, except that traveling through or along a closed or exclusion area while going to or from an open area is not

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considered hunting. Possessing a loaded weapon under any conditions is considered hunting. Therefore, hunters entering an area before legal shooting hours, or exiting an area after legal shooting hours must unload their weapons or they will be presumed to be hunting. The only exception to this is for authorized night hunters.

Hunting season. That period of time when hunting a specific game bird or animal is permitted under the law.

Illegal possession. Possession of any wildlife or parts thereof, at any time other than during the authorized hunting season for that wildlife.

Maintained road. Maintained roads are those roads with a base consisting of pavement, concrete, gravel, or improved dirt that receive regular or periodic maintenance and are wide enough to allow at least two-way vehicular traffic. Roads that are not maintained consist of small roads and trails with a dirt or clay base that receive little or no maintenance and that are only wide enough for one-way vehicular traffic or narrower.

Open area. Training areas that are available for recreational use, subject to fulfillment of an individual's permit, license, and area access pass requirements.

Size limit. The minimum length allowable for a fish in a person's possession. Fish smaller than this size must be returned to the water unharmed as soon as they are landed.

Sportsman. Any person engaged in hunting, fishing or other outdoor recreation activities on the Pine Bluff Arsenal military installation. This includes those engaged in any out of season activity that would support latter hunting or fishing.

Storage of weapons: A weapon is "stored" at the normal or temporary place the hunter keeps his/her weapon. A hunter does not improperly store a weapon in a vehicle by placing the weapon in the vehicle, if he/she intends to hunt on post that day or has already hunted and will remove the weapon from the vehicle later that day. The rule also applies to other legitimate recreational, sport shooting, or other recognized functions involving the weapon.

To take an animal. To harass, harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, capture, or collect, or to attempt to do any of the above.

Unloaded weapon. A shotgun, centerfire or rimfire rifle, or handgun that does not have any ammunition in the chamber, or a loaded magazine/clip affixed to the weapon. A muzzleloader weapon that does not have a percussion cap, flint, powder or other firing device affixed to or resting on the weapon's nipple or flash pan. An uncocked crossbow with the bolt removed from the platform.

Weapons. Firearms, bows, air or CO2 rifles or pistols, and slingshots are considered to be weapons on PBA.

Upon satisfactory completion of the appropriate combination of suspension and/or community service and successful completion of an appropriate Safety Course if required, offenders may apply to regain their hunting/fishing privileges. Participation in this program is at the discretion of the Hearing Officer and is subject to the availability of supervisors.
